Catherine, who resides in Upper Saddle River is a National Merit Finalist, an AP Scholar with Distinction, and recipient of the Harvard Book Award.

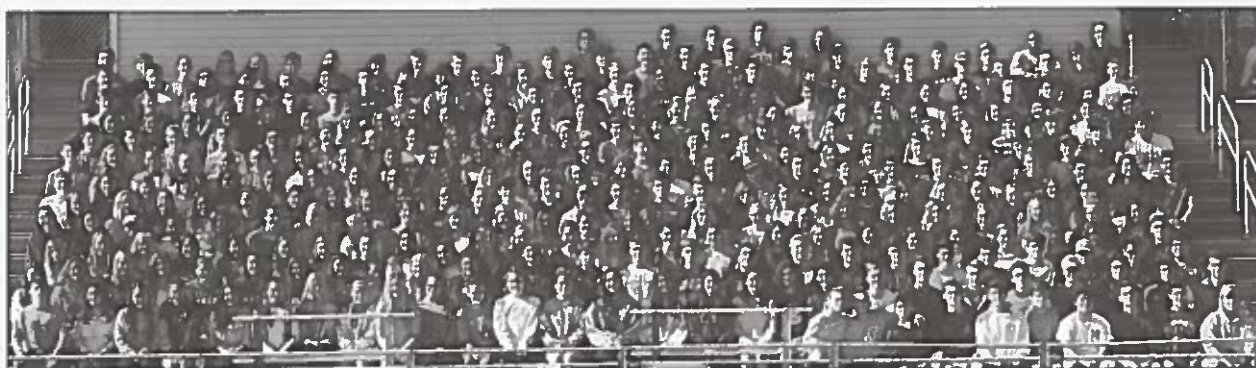

NH Hosts Refugees

Northern Highlands hosted an assembly program in order to promote a greater sense of Global Citizenship on Friday January 26, 2018. As a part of our strategic plan, our district has made it a goal to graduate students who are socially conscious, globally aware, and are able to think independently. To that end, students gained a greater perspective of current issues with the "Young Refugee Voices" program. Our goal was to raise student awareness of what refugees experience and to use that information to develop a more informed opinion about this pivotal topic in our nation today.

Last school year, Mrs. Joanna Petritsis of our World Language department attended an educators' global education conference at the United Nations whose theme was the international refugee crisis. Over 65 million people are displaced from their homes around the world. A panel of young people from various countries told stories of escaping war and direct threats to themselves and their families. They are now living with their families in the U.S., extremely grateful to have been rescued by the U.N., and to the U.S. for having accepted them. On our panel, Northern Highlands hosted two students: Maher Mahmood and Gladys Mwilelo Ndengo. Maher is originally from Iraq and Gladys is from Burundi (a refugee of the war in the Democratic Republic of the Congo). They and their families have endured violence and had to leave their homes under urgent circumstances. The U.N. helped their families escape and find refuge in other countries before coming to the U.S., where they are now leading successful and productive lives. Each guest retold powerful and inspiring stories about their journey, which provided the extraordinary insight we had hoped to impart upon our students.

From the Superintendent



Highlanders,

As quickly as the year started it seems to be ending. After an exceptionally cold and snowy winter, the warm weather is finally here and we are able to enjoy the outdoor activities that come with it.

This has been a wonderful year for Northern Highlands. We have seen continual upgrades to our campus including many which will provide energy savings

to the district. Over the summer and into the next school year we look forward to completing even more projects, such as the replacement of many of our classroom windows, completion of the solar panel project, refurbishing the front gym, as well as many other projects that will enhance our school.

As for our academic program, administration and teachers have spent the school year working to ensure that our students have the best possible high school experiences in order to prepare them for post high school plans. As such, we look forward to implementing several Option 2 programs next year including an Internship Program and Community Service which will both officially launch in the 2nd semester. In addition to the Option 2 program Highlands will offer numerous new courses (both full and half year) for the 2018/2019 school year. These courses were created and developed based on feedback from students, teachers and community members. These additions to our academic program will only further solidify the high level of preparation that is offered at Highlands.

School security is also a priority in our district and improvements are ongoing. Breezeway doors in-between buildings on the first floor are now locked during the school day. Students have adapted well to using only the second floor to get to their classes, rather than going outside between buildings. All doors to the building are now closed during the entire school day. Over the summer, we will be making two other improvements in the building. First, we will be changing all the locks on the classroom doors in the building, so that they are two-way, allowing teachers to lock them from the inside, if necessary. Secondly, we will be building an enclosed vestibule in front of the building, outside of where the current front desk is. This vestibule will house a security staff. Visitors will not be allowed into the building unless they pass clearance from security.

Before we head off on our own ways during the summer months, please join me in wishing a huge congratulation to the class of 2018. May each of their post High School journeys be exactly what they hope it to be. These 333 young adults have been a significant part of the Highlands family and we will miss each and everyone one of them as they move on to the next phase of their lives.

May all of our community members have an enjoyable summer and a reminder that if you ever need us, administration is in the building 12 months a year. Please feel free to stop in to see us or call as we always enjoy the open communication with our communities.

School Store Renovation

Every year, the Northern Highlands DECA chapter undertakes a major project within the school known as the "Learn and Earn." The objective of the project is to educate Northern Highlands students about the values and skills needed to succeed in the business world, and to earn as much money as possible to subsidize the DECA Chapter's trip to the international competition. For the 2017-2018 school year, the project was spearheaded by seniors Evan Casalino, Jacob Mendel, and Emma Vingan. In conjunction with faculty sponsors and other students, the team launched a yearlong endeavor to rebrand and rethink the Highlands School Store.

Over the summer, the project co-chairs launched a renovation of the store that included a reduction of clutter, a redesigned floor plan aimed at streamlining foot traffic, a fresh paint coat, new shelving, and the addition of a large Northern Highlands logo painted by Highlands senior Julia Mastroiano.

At the start of the school year, the team began to improve the store's operational procedures. Jacob Mendel worked closely with Business Education Teacher Mrs. DeVoe to minimize costs and renegotiate supply chains for both the brick-and-mortar and online stores. Evan Casalino held training sessions to teach DECA members the principles of retail sales and the specific guidelines of the store, and these DECA volunteers went on to become responsible for working behind the counter after school almost every day. Emma Vingan helped to create marketing promotions and sales incentives that ranged from newly-designed merchandise offerings to a Junior Parking Pass raffle.

Thus far, the renovation and rebranding of the store has more than doubled sales, increased profits (after donations) by \$2,995.81, and drastically increased the number of students involved in the running of the store. College Application Totals

The Northern Highlands High School class of 2018 (333 students) sent 7% more applications to colleges as compared to last year. The reason? Colleges have ramped up recruitment through the web and social media, and there is much more access to applications through the Common Application and the Coalition Application. Although the number of high school students in the US has started to level-off, students on average are applying to more colleges. All of this creates the perfect recipe for increased application numbers, making applicant pools larger and more competitive.

Because students are applying to more colleges than ever before, they have more options, making it harder for colleges to predict whether or not certain admitted students will ultimately enroll. This dramatic increase in applications is largely a result of more students applying to more colleges and universities each year. This shift seems to indicate the continuance of a trend of lower and lower acceptance rates at the nation's top universities. It has never been easy to gain admission to these schools, but it is now more challenging to do so than ever before.

Several top colleges and universities have recently revealed noteworthy leaps in the number of applications from last year (college

class of 2021) to this year (college class of 2022). Harvard University: 8.2% increase in applications; Bowdoin College: 25% increase in applications; New York University: 12% increase in applications; Boston College: 9% increase in regular applications and 15% increase in early applications and Northwestern University: 8.5% increase in applications.

The Northern Highlands Class of 2018, as of April 13, 2018, has sent out a total of 87 Early Decision applications. Early Decision results are binding. Out of the 87, 52 have been accepted and five have been deferred to the regular application pool; an increase in the number of non-binding Early Decision applications compared to last year. The class of 2018 sent out 838 Early Action applications with 480 accepted and 50 deferred to the regular application pool. Overall, the school counselors processed 3,064 applications with 1,274 reported acceptances to date.

Although the above numbers may seem discouraging to some, parents and students should feel comforted that on average, 98% of Northern Highlands seniors attend college showing that there is a college that is right for everyone. Northern Highlands wishes all of our students the best success in wherever they decide to go!

Chinese Classes Visit Rutgers University for Chinese New Year Celebration

26 students, drawn from the Chinese courses at Highlands, visited Rutgers University's New Brunswick Campus on February 10. The Highlanders attended a celebration of the Chinese New Year at the school's Confucian Institute. Tables were situated throughout the conference hall. At each table, a specific Chinese art form or cultural practice was presented including paper-cutting, calligraphy, Chinese opera, Chinese painting, dumpling making, lion dance, performances on musical instruments and other activities.





National Merit Scholarship Program – Finalists

Catherine Lenihan and Armaan Tobaccowalla were named Finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®)—which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.6 million entrants each year. Becoming a National Merit Finalist is competitive and requires a top score on the PSAT. Both Catherine and Armaan scored in the top 1% on the PSAT.

NH Represented on Cyber Crimes Task Force

Assistant Principal Michael Koth was recently invited to speak on a panel of educators before the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Cyber Crimes Task Force. Led by Task Force member and Saddle River Detective Sergeant Timothy Gerity, the discussion focused on the topic of how cyberbullying, harassment, sexting, and other technology related matters are handled by school officials. All public schools in the State of New Jersey are required to sign the Uniform Memorandum of Agreement between Schools and Local Law Enforcement. This agreement is a document that outlines agreed upon procedures for information sharing between agencies. The Cyber Crimes Task Force is comprised of detectives and officers from local municipalities around the county who conduct cyber safety seminars, handle criminal investigations involving the internet and technology and assist multiple other law enforcement agencies with handling technology-related investigations and evidence.

Mr. Koth discussed with officers how schools receive allegations, reviewed investigative and assessment techniques, as well as at which point school officials deem it necessary to involve the local authorities. This offered officers, as well as the school administrators present, an opportunity to engage in meaningful dialogue regarding these topics and share best practices on investigating incidents of this nature. Much of the discussion centered on how to best protect the interests of all students involved. Northern Highlands is a proud partner with all of our local police departments and we continually look for methods to strengthen our already strong relationships.

Highlands Moving 1-to-1 To Hewlett Packard

The Northern Highlands 1-to-1 initiative is continually being evaluated to increase technology integration into the curriculum as well as to improve the cost efficiencies of the program. After an extensive evaluation of the device, Northern Highlands has decided to purchase the HP Pro X2 for freshman students beginning in 2018.

The HP Pro X2 is a direct competitor of the MS Surface Pro, which the district currently uses in its 1-to-1 initiative. The HP Pro X2 and the MS Surface Pro both run the Windows 10 operating system as well as the exact same software.

One of the main benefits of the HP Pro X2 is HP's ability to offer a cost-effective, full 4-year accidental damage protection (ADP) and hardware warranty program. This coverage is for the computer as well as all of its peripherals. The BOE is happy to pass along the savings of this program to the parents. Freshmen parents will be migrated from a \$110 annual optional insurance program to a \$60 annual, mandatory computer user fee. The fee will cover all ADP and hardware warranty issues except for theft/loss. All sophomores, juniors, and seniors will continue to use their current MS Surface Pro and will have the ability to purchase the optional computer insurance coverage from the Northern Highlands BOE for \$110.

Northern Highlands is excited about its new partnership with HP. The district is confident that staff, students, and parents will be extremely happy with the new HP Pro X2 being issued to incoming freshmen students.



Into the Woods

In March, the Northern Highlands Theater Company presented *Into the Woods*. One of Stephen Sondheim's most popular shows, *Into the Woods* is a sophisticated musical which offers a sometimes dark glimpse into the reality behind well-known fairy tales. In the play, the Narrator guided the audience through the unexpected intersections of some famous fairy tale characters: a childless Baker and his Wife, Cinderella, Rapunzel and her powerful mother--the Witch, Little Red Riding Hood, and Jack. As these characters tried to have their own wishes fulfilled, and thus find their happy ending, their paths cross in extraordinary ways in the woods. Although almost everyone's wish is granted, the consequences of their actions returned to haunt them later with disastrous results that happen after the "happily ever after."



Northern Highlands Names Teacher of the Year

During his tenure at Northern Highlands, Mr. Witkowski has also advised the NH Academic team, Class Council, Model UN Program and served as the assistant Boys varsity basketball coach.

NOT EVEN ONCE

During the week of January 9-12, the Allendale Police Department presented a 4 day program called "Not Even Once" in junior health classes at Northern Highlands. This program was developed in Manchester Township in South Jersey in response to their growing opiate use problem. Officer Paul Stettner coordinated the program with Steve Simonetti, Supervisor of Health and Wellness.

The officers, Alex Helmer, Kevin Azevedo, Scott Kuenzel and Paul Stettner presented the curriculum focusing on the causes and short and long term impact of using opiates. The 4 days included bringing in speakers who are in the process of recovering from opiate abuse. These speakers had a positive impact on many of the students and teachers who listened to them present their experiences with opiate abuse. The program was well received by the students and staff.

New Courses for the 2018-2019 School Year

Northern Highlands will be introducing a multitude of new elective courses to its Program of Studies for the 2018-2019 school year. These changes will augment our current offerings and allow students more diverse offerings.

AP English Literature (Full-Year)

The course provides high-achieving juniors and seniors with opportunities to do close readings of texts and to practice analytical and critical writing.

AP Computer Principles (Full-Year)

AP Computer Science Principles introduces students to the foundations of computer science with a focus on how computing powers the world.

AP Human Geography (Full-Year)

The AP Human Geography course is equivalent to an introductory college-level course in human geography. The course introduces students to the systematic study of patterns and processes that have shaped human understanding, use, and alteration of Earth's surface.

SUPA Sociology (Full-Year)

This is a dual enrollment college course offered through Syracuse University. This is an analytic, skill-based introduction to sociology that encourages students to see and think about the social world, themselves, and the relations between themselves and the social world in new ways. Major topics include: culture, groups, and social structure; the power and influence of the media; self and identity; social inequalities based on race, class, and gender; and social change.

Internship – Option 2 (Full-Year or Semester)

The Option Two Senior Internship provides eligible students with an opportunity to engage in experiential learning outside of the traditional classroom environment. Students who complete the internship requirements will obtain credit for participating in a full year, half year or summer internship.

Introduction to Philosophy (Semester)

Introduction to Philosophy examines the central questions of human existence. The course addresses three central philosophic problems: (1) epistemological questions concerning the nature of knowledge and truth, (2) ethical questions concerning morality and living a good life, and (3) metaphysical questions on the meaning of self and the nature of reality.

Criminal Law (Semester)

This introduction to Criminal Law will involve the study of the agencies and processes involved in the criminal justice system, including the legislature, the courts, and the police.

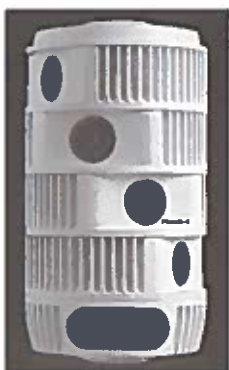
Public Speaking (Semester)

Communication is the bedrock of all human relations. This course is aimed at building confidence, competency, and pride in public speaking. While learning skills and habits, students will have the opportunity to refine their speaking and listening.

NH Student Receives Perfect Score on AP Exam

Advanced Placement Exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 5, with a 5 being equivalent to a grade of "A" in the corresponding college level course. Senior Jeremy Paton not only scored a 5 on his Macroeconomics Exam, but he was one of only 60 students in the world to earn every point possible on the exam. This outstanding accomplishment is not only a reflection on Jeremy's academic ability, but also a reflection on the teachers who are responsible for engaging students to learn and excel.

NH Adds Live Streaming Capabilities

Northern Highlands is now able to offer parents the ability to subscribe to live sporting and other events from either the main gym or the all-purpose athletic field. This was made possible by the Northern Highlands Sports Association who generously donated 1 of the 2 cameras necessary to make this possible. The camera is called a Pixellot which is outfitted with four cameras, tracking software, and the ability to seamlessly stitch together the images from the cameras. This allows for the filming of events without any human interaction. The live events will be offered to parents via monthly, sports season, or annual subscriptions. NH Classroom Featured on Classroom Close-up

On April 5, 2018 Classroom Close-Up visited Northern Highlands to film Ms. Reynold's Robotics Class on "WaterBotics". Classroom Close-up is a New Jersey Education Association (NJEA) weekly series that focuses on innovative projects in New Jersey Public Schools.

The Water Robotics project at Northern Highlands highlights the collaboration skills, problem-solving tactics, and innovation of its students. This project allows them to dive into the world of water engineering, a huge industry in the past decade. The class simulates oil spills and underwater mines during the project to further challenge the students. The students use LEGOS to complete the activity, which allows flexibility for rapid prototyping and redesign; which is essential in engineering. The students learn and apply various scientific principles such as buoyancy which enables them to create robots that float and dive underwater. Tinkering, creativity, teamwork, and perseverance are all displayed during this project, which helps to build strong and confident students and can ultimately lead to successful engineers for our future!

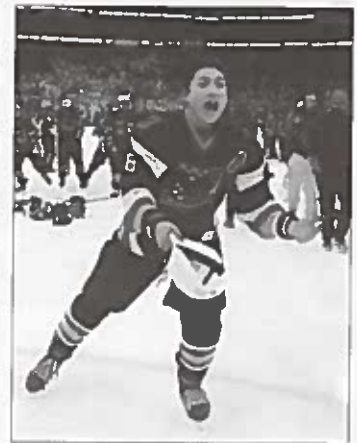


Hockey Wins First State Title

On January 26, 2018, Italian IV Honors students attended a field trip to visit the Michelangelo: "Divine Draftsman and Designer" Exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Students were provided a guided tour of Renaissance Art where students analyzed various paintings and sculptures by artists such as Rafael, Bronzino and Tullio Lombardo. The group also worked collaboratively to analyze and reenact scenes from the Botticelli painting, Three Mirables of Saint Zenobius. Following the Renaissance tour, students participated in a scavenger-hunt through the once-in-a-lifetime Michelangelo Exhibition. This exhibition presents 133 of his drawings, three of his marble sculptures, his earliest painting, his wood architectural model for a chapel vault, as well as an extensive amount of complementary works by other artists for comparison and context.
